### **Course Description**

Ludwig Wittgenstein (1889-1951) was one of the greatest philosophers of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. His groundbreaking Philosophical Investigations will be the subject of this course. In reading the Investigations, we will be confronted with some of philosophy's most pressing questions, including: What is the relationship between language and the world? What is truth? What does it mean to have a mind?

This course presumes no familiarity with Wittgenstein's work.

Student grades will be based on three, 5-7 page papers.

I have very specific requirements for the papers and my assignments will require you to have a good understanding of material that will mostly be presented in the lectures. Obviously, then, regular attendance is crucial for your success in this course.
